	procedures regarding registered sex offenders	Brian Tupper		

Woods: Megan's Law lists the names, photos and addresses of some registered sex offenders online. Sex offenders are common and the registry goes back a long time. Being registered as a sex offender can be required for committing crimes such as selling pornography to a minor or mooning a police officer as well as for other serious offenses. Registered sex offenders are required to register at the local law enforcement agency in which they reside. Registered sex offenders who go to college must register with campus police. However, our Public Safety offices are not a police agency nor are our officers police. Our staff have no greater legal authority than we do as citizens. Local law enforcement usually does not notify the campus public safety officers of sex offenders living in the area. A registered sex offender may be registered with the police and years later choose to attend the college. The CCC system believes that all people deserve an education regardless of any criminal past.

Miladinova: Potential conflict between rights of minors (middle college students) and registered sex offenders.

Woods/Tupper: Our PS department can ask if parole officers will notify them about sex offenders who have registered at one of our campuses. But parole officers have huge caseloads; the parole officers want prior offenders to have access to an education so that they can become contributing members of society. Recommendations to avoid inappropriate contact with a minor: (a) avoid inappropriate contact between anyone in our classes, (b) follow up if something seems inappropriate; (c) contact public safety for help with follow-up if necessary.

Miladinova: District needs a policy to prevent such events.

Anderson: If the AS wants to take on this policy, we could move a resolution forward. If it's supported and complies with the law and serves faculty interests, it could be added to board policy. Suggestion: faculty should provide clear guidelines regarding physical contact on course syllabus; all students are held to the same requirements.

Miladinova: Such guidelines should be supported by board policy; we need both—policies on syllabus and support of Board.

Lacefield: Whatever we ask for in the area of disclosure would have to be voluntary on part of student; we can't and don't request documentation of students.

Medina: How do we define 'clarity' in a dance class that requires close contact?

Woods/Tupper: Massage therapy class at Skyline had to come up with a clear policy. Could serve as a

Doug: Since the district chooses to participate in the State's Flex Calendar program, the district is required to provide training in order to get apportionment (but we no longer get apportionment since we are community supported). That means we should have greater flexibility in what is offered and what counts for flex day. Monica: The district has been creating workshops rather than encouraging departmental and program review work; the latter should be acceptable as a flex day activity. Michael: It would be helpful if we had a balanced set of options. Denise: We should be consulted more. Katie: We need better communication to people whose proposals were denied or deferred.
