Summer outreach: Street Team walks around events, directs people to Cañada table. The department keeps track of metrics to check the success of the different approaches used. Q: If a promotional material has been created by the Marketing Dept, why does it have to have to be stamped by the Office of Student Life? A: That's a long-standing policy of the Office of Student Life- follow up with them. Suggestion: It seems like the Marketing Dept. focuses more on the college level. 	the class. Now that Inclusive Access is priced as a package, as opposed to per textbook, there is a cost advantage (cheaper) plus instructor has flexibility for last minute changes. Only about 2% of students in courses with Inclusive Access opt-out. There is a trend from publishers to not provide bound textbooks; the print upgrade is loose-leaf but at deeply discounted price. With Inclusive Access, there is also an advantage for students in terms of privacy. Publisher only gets students' name and email address.
