




Chance of Winning Presidency







### Joint Statement from California Legislative Leaders on Result of Presidential Election

Wednesday, November 09, 2016

SACRAMENTO - California Senate President pro Tempore Kevin de León (D-Los Angeles) and California Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon (D-Paramount) released the following statement on the results of the President election:

Today, we woke up feeling like strangers in a foreign land, because yesterday Americans expressed their views on a pluralistic and democratic society that are clearly inconsistent with the values of the people of California.

We have never been more proud to be Californians.

By a margin in the millions, Californians overwhelmingly rejected politics fueled by resentment, bigotry, and misogyny.

The largest state of the union and the strongest driver of our nation's economy has shown it has its surest conscience as well.

California is - and must always be - a refuge of justice and opportunity for people of all walks, talks, ages and aspirations - regardless of how you look, where you live, what language you speak, or who you love.

California has long set an example for other states to follow. And California will defend its people and our progress. We are not going to allow one election to reverse generations of progress at the height of our historic diversity, scientific advancement, economic output, and sense of global responsibility.

We will be reaching out to federal, state and local officials to evaluate how a Trump Presidency will potentially impact federal funding of ongoing state programs, job-creating investments reliant on foreign trade, and federal enforcement of laws affecting the rights of people living in our state. We will maximize the time during the presidential transition to defend our accomplishments using every tool at our disposal.

While Donald Trump may have won the presidency, he hasn't changed our values. America is greater than any one man or party. We will not be dragged back into the past. We will lead the resistance to any effort that would shred our social fabric or our Constitution.

## California just took a step to block Trump's efforts on offshore oil drilling

Offshore oil drilling is shaping up as the next big fight in the California vs. Trump war.



In response to President Donald Trump's latest executive order aimed at expanding offshore oil drilling in federal waters and opening up other areas to new oil and gas exploration, state Sen. Hannah-Beth Jackson is proposing new legislation to block Trump's efforts.



Jackson, a Democrat from Santa Barbara, said she'll unveil legislation next week to prevent new leases in state waters for construction of new pipelines or other infrastructure needed for expansion of oil and gas development.



"Why should we go back to the dirty, dangerous and destructive policies of the '60s, '70s and '80s?" Jackson asked in a media call Friday. "President Trump and his oil industry cronies may want to drill, but we're going to stop that oil and gas development from being feasible by preventing it from being shipped or pipelined ashore – from being transported processed and utilized."



Existing law establishes the border between the United States and Mexico, which includes the southern border of California.


This bill would require any federally funded infrastructure project along California's southern border that exceeds a cost of \$1 billion to first be approved by a majority of the voters voting on the issue at a statewide general election. The bill also would make related findings and declarations. declarations related to a wall on the border between California and Mexico.

This bill would-additionally prohibit the state, commencing January 1, 2018, from awarding or renewing-a any contract-for goods or services with any person, as defined, that at the time of bid or proposal for a new contract or renewal of an existing contract is providing or has provided goods or services to the federal government for the construction of a federally funded-infrastructure project wall, fence, or other barrier along California's southern border.

Existing law defines "responsible bidder" for the purposes of public works contracts as a bidder who has demonstrated the attribute of





### **HOW THE CHANCELLOR'S OFFICE CAN LEAD THE WAY**

The Chancellor should make it clear that the system office should **enable**, **not stifle**, **innovation on the ground**. The Chancellor can commit to fostering a culture of open-mindedness and creativity to support colleges that want to try a promising new idea. The Chancellor can also commit to providing political back-up to thoughtful innovators, **offering support**, **not blame**, when experiments fall short despite good planning.

Additionally, the Chancellor should encourage the Board of Governors to seek ways to use flexibility as a tool for motivating change and best practices when possible. For instance, the Chancellor's Office should explore ways to loosen or waive those categorical program requirements that are barriers to thoughtful innovation. The Chancellor should work with partners in state government to explore policy and funding innovations that would provide greater flexibility in exchange for demonstrated success, exemptions from rigid seat-time requirements in certain instances that stimulate improved student outcomes, and solutions to address the volatility and instability of enrollment-driven funding.





The difference between the Republican presidential margin at the national level and in the median congressional district or state





Figure 6: California Population and Population Projections (25-64), Percent Share by Ethnicity, 1980-2060













#### **REVISED LOW INCOME LIMITS**

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has updated their income limits to indicate what is considered low income across different counties. In Alameda County, for example, a family of four is now considered low income on an \$80,000-per-year income, up from \$75,150 last year. San Francisco's limit is the highest, with \$105,000 per year for a four-person family considered low income,






